Retired Washington Supreme Court Justice Bobbe J. Bridge: "A Judge's Search for Children's Rights: The Center for Children & Youth Justice"

Thursday, May 17, 11:45 a.m. Seattle Yacht Club 1807 E. Hamlin Street, Seattle

Bobbe J. Bridge is the founding president and CEO of the Center for Children & Youth Justice (CCYJ), a nonprofit organization she created in 2006 to reform Washington State's child welfare and juvenile justice systems. She served on the Washington Supreme Court from 2000 to 2008. Before that, she served on the King County Superior Court from 1990 to 2000, where she was chief Juvenile Court judge for three years. She continues to chair the Washington State Supreme Court Commission on Children in Foster Care.

Before joining the bench, Justice Bridge was the first female partner at the Seattle law firm of Garvey Schubert Barer. She has been honored with numerous awards for her civic involvement, philanthropy, and service to children and youth. Bridge will discuss the formation of CCYJ and its work to improve the lives of children and youth in the foster care and juvenile justice systems.

Bridge is a Phi Bete and has served on the board of trustees of the Puget Sound Association of Phi Beta Kappa.

The luncheon will take place on Thursday, May 17, at the Seattle Yacht Club. Free parking is available in the adjacent parking lot. The luncheon starts at 11:45 a.m.; doors open at 11:30 a.m. The cost is \$40 per person and guests are welcome. Results from the PSA-PBK membership survey

Thanks to all who participated in our 5-minute online membership survey. Seventy-two of you expressed your thoughts around finding value in PSA-PBK activities and programs, offering comments and advice. Some highlights:

Membership still skews towards the mature end of the spectrum. However, we have seen growth in the younger age range as well. We have made conscious efforts to try new activities and programs appealing to the future of our organization.

It was noteworthy that the top two benefits valued by members were "champions liberal education" and "supports scholarships and awards."

Respondents provided valuable comments and suggestions for improvements, which the board will use in becoming even more relevant and of value to our membership.

The Phi Beta Kappa Society has 286 chapters at colleges and universities around the country. Their primary mission is to invite students in the liberal arts and sciences to become members of Phi Beta Kappa, based on academic success and breadth of study. There are also 50 Phi Beta Kappa alumni associations, including the Puget Sound Association. PSA-PBK was founded in 1951 by Seattle-area members from the University of Washington and the community to support liberal education. Our constitution was adopted by the Phi Beta Kappa Society on January 22, 1953 — 65 years ago.

Soon afterwards, PSA-PBK began its High School Book Awards program, which continues to this day. In 1969 we began our scholarships, which are now offered to undergraduate and graduate students at the University of Washington and the University of Puget Sound. We have subsequently added our Pathfinder Awards and Humanities Achievement Awards.

Scholarships offered by PSA-PBK

PSA-PBK supports education in several ways, including through direct financial support to students at the University of Washington and the University of Puget Sound. Our two scholarship programs, one for undergraduates and one for graduate students, are named for inspirational former board members.

The Ernest R. Stiefel Graduate Study Award is given annually to an outstanding student who is starting graduate or professional school at either UPS or UW. Candidates must be members of Phi Beta Kappa. The award is \$4,500 and the application due date each year is June 30.

The Gerald J. Oppenheimer Undergraduate Scholarships are awarded to UPS and UW undergraduates. Each spring, the schools invite a few students with very high GPAs to submit an application by writing a brief essay on the question "What book would you recommend to every college student?" We give \$2,000 scholarships to five students, one of whom is also selected to receive the additional \$400 Ellsworth C. Alvord Jr. award.

News from the UW Chapter

The University of Washington Alpha Chapter of Phi Beta Kappa held its annual reception on February 15. Each year, the chapter invites a distinguished UW faculty member to give an informal talk. This year, we were delighted that Professor Amy Snover, who is director of the Climate Impacts Group and assistant dean of applied research in the College of the Environment, could join us at the event.

Attendees listened with great interest as Snover reflected on her 20 years at the interface of scholarship and decision-making on climate change. She addressed the challenges she faces as she navigates the personal, institutional, and societal pressures on freedom of expression in politically conflicted contexts.

The reception brings together new student Phi Betes, invitees, campus Phi Betes, and guests for conversation and refreshments, and to learn more about the Phi Beta Kappa Society.

Phi Beta Kappa Triennial Council

The Triennial Council is the legislative body of the Phi Beta Kappa Society, which convenes every three years to conduct the society's business. Phi Beta Kappa executives and senators, as well as representatives from the society's 286 college/university chapters and 50 alumni associations, meet to charter new chapters, elect new leadership for the following triennium, and discuss policies affecting the society as a whole. Attendees will also have the opportunity to attend lectures highlighting excellence in the liberal arts and sciences, and will meet with other representatives to share ideas for member events and strengthening our chapters and alumni associations.

The 45th Triennial will be held from August 2–4, 2018, in Boston, Massachusetts. Representatives from PSA-PBK, the University of Washington Alpha Chapter, and the University of Puget Sound Delta Chapter are invited to attend.

Pathfinder Awards

Each year at our spring luncheon we honor individuals, businesses, or institutions with our Pathfinder Award. The award reflects the imagery on the Phi Beta Kappa key — a hand pointing to the stars. It honors those who encourage others to seek new worlds to discover, pathways to explore, and untouched destinations to reach. These awards will be presented at our luncheon on May 17.

Humanities Achievement Award

On the 50th anniversary of the National Endowment of the Humanities and National Endowment of the Arts in 2015, PSA-PBK established its Humanities Achievement Award to recognize individuals and institutions who have contributed outstanding work in the humanities. At our spring luncheon, the following award will be presented.

David Armstrong, executive producer/artistic director of the 5th Avenue Theatre, for developing it into one of our nation's leading theatre companies, developing new works and innovative staging of acclaimed classical musicals. He has fostered local talent and developed mentoring programs to support young artists.
